ABOUT OUR CHARITY

The Lions Sick Children's Fund has been helping sick kids in New Brunswick since 2001. This past fall, the group reached an incredible milestone. Since 2001, the Lions Sick Children's Fund has raised over a \$1.7 million to help 1,180 families in New Brunswick. In 2024, we helped 139 families. This has been done all through the hard work of some very dedicated volunteers who share one thing in common – the passion and commitment to help local families.

The Lions Sick Children's Fund helps parents pay for the travel and medical expenses of their kids requiring medical treatment outside the province.

THE HISTORY OF DRAGON BOATING

Dragon boating is one of the fastest-growing sports in the world. It's easy to learn, safe to do, and it's fun! A crew of twenty, seated in two parallel columns of ten people each, paddle to the beat of a drummer stationed at the bow of the dragon boat. A steersperson, standing at the stern, navigates the racecourse with the help of a single, long oar.

A dragon boat is a long, narrow boat designed to resemble a dragon with a dragon head and tail affixed to the bow and stern, respectively. The boat's sides are brightly painted with dragon scales. A dragon boat typically measures about 12.5 metres (41 feet) long and approximately 1.2 metres (4 feet) across at its widest point. Empty, the type of dragon boat used by 22 Dragons weighs 260 kg or 570 pounds!

During a race, however, the paddlers must propel a boat and crew weighing almost 2,300kg or 5,000 pounds. (Whew!) A typical dragon boat race is 500 metres, during which the paddle stroke rate can range between 60 and 100 strokes per minute. A 500-metre race usually lasts about 2 minutes and 20 seconds. While sprint races of 250 metres are not uncommon, paddlers also compete in endurance races of 6km, lasting over 30 minutes. But don't worry – our race is a "sprint" and only 250 metres long, lasting about 1 minute and 15 seconds. ☺

From a spectator's perspective, dragon boat races are colourful and exciting. Dragon boats come streaking down the water with drums beating, paddles splashing and fans cheering for their favourite teams.

Dragon boat racing is an international sport with competitions annually held at the world level. The International Dragon Boat Federation, based in the United Kingdom, is the body charged with governing the sport across the globe. The sport is currently seeking Olympic status. Dragon boating is governed nationally by Dragon Boat Canada.

Dragon boating originates from China where legend has it that a poet named Yuan was expelled from office by a corrupt administration. Protesting the corruption, Yuan drowned himself in the Mi Lo River, near present-day Yue Yang. Local fishers, seeing his plight, rushed out in boats to save him. They beat drums, thrashed the water with paddles and threw rice dumplings into the river to appease the water dragon. This event has been commemorated in an annual festival which has evolved into present-day dragon boat racing.

FESTIVAL F.A.Q.s

When does the Festival take place?

The Festival takes place the annually, the last full / partial weekend in May.

Where will the Festival be held?

The Festival is held on Jones Lake. The Athlete's Village for our teams is situated on the grounds right next to the dock at Jones Lake. You can access the Festival site off St. George Blvd by Hillcrest School.

Who will race and when?

High School teams race on Friday afternoon, beginning at approximately 1:00pm and finishing before sunset. Corporate and Community teams take to the water early Saturday morning, starting at about 9:00am and racing until 3:00pm.

I thought Dragon Boats were associated with breast cancer?

Some Dragon Boat festivals do focus on breast cancer survivors. Our Festival is a major fundraiser for the Lions Sick Children's Fund. Having said that, we do have a breast cancer survivor team category. We also hold a traditional carnation ceremony on Saturday mid-way through the event. The involvement of Breast Cancer teams from our region has always been a very special part of our Festival.

How many people do you need to make a team?

There are 20 paddlers in a boat, plus a drummer and a steersperson. We will provide the steersperson for you! We also recommend that you have one or two extra paddlers for substitutions throughout the day.

Why do we need a drummer?

The drummer helps keep the rhythm of the stroke which helps your team paddle together. That is the key to success – teamwork! We usually recommend that your drummer be one of your lighter weight paddlers, as well as someone who is comfortable in a boat.

What does a Team Captain do?

The Team Captain is your leader. He or she will make sure you have enough paddlers and a drummer. The Team Captain will share Festival information with the

team and help them get ready for the big day. The Team Captain is also responsible for making sure each paddler signs a waiver form before practice.

Do we need a Pledge Coordinator?

Yes – your Pledge Coordinator will collect all monies raised by the team and forward them to the GMDBF. The Pledge Coordinator is sometimes the same person as the Team Captain, but the Pledge Coordinator doesn't necessarily have to be a paddler on your team!

How do we register our team?

All you have to do to register is go to www.monctondragonboat.com and fill in the online registration form. Please be sure to give us accurate contact information so we can share important updates with you as the Festival approaches.

How much is the registration fee?

Community and Corporate teams pay a registration fee of \$600 (\$500 if paid before March 31st, 2026). High School teams pay a reduced registration fee of \$200. Registration fees go toward the operating costs of the festival and are not eligible for a charitable receipt.

How much do we have to raise?

Each team must raise a *minimum* of \$1800 in pledges. At first this sometimes seems difficult, but with more than 20 people per team, that's less than \$100 each to raise! Prizes are given to the top team fundraisers.

Where does the money all go?

60% of the funds raised go to support the Lions Sick Children's Fund. The other 40% goes to a charity of your team's choice. High Schools may also designate their 40% toward safe grad activities.

What if we are short a paddler for our team?

If you are short a paddler, let our committee know by emailing us at monctondragonboat@gmail.com. We will try to match you with single paddlers who contact us.

I would like to paddle. Can I join a team?

If you would like to join a team, please contact us at monctondragonboat@gmail.com. We will try to match you with a team that is short paddlers. Single paddlers may be asked by the team they join to help with fundraising.

I've never been in a dragon boat! Do we get to practice?

Yes! Practices will be held the weekend before the big event. As we get closer to the festival, you will be able to sign up for a practice time that Saturday or Sunday. Each team will have one practice session before the event. No experience is necessary! We will provide lifejackets and paddles. (If you prefer to wear your own lifejacket, it must be a certified PFD.) All you need is weather-appropriate clothing for the day.

Will there be food at the Festival?

Yes, we have a variety of vendors offering food and beverages at the festival.

How many times does our team race?

Every team will have at least two races. After the first two “heats” or rounds, we will take a break to award prizes to the Best Dressed Drummer and Top Fundraising Team. Then the **top six teams (based on fastest time)** will race to determine our **gold, silver and bronze** medalists. **Who will take home the Dragon Boat Trophy?!**

COLLECTING PLEDGES

- Donations of \$25 or more are eligible for a charitable tax receipt.
- Team pledges will be recorded on the excel PLEDGE SHEET found on our website. Please be sure to fill in the sheet completely – this helps us ensure that all your generous donors get their tax receipts! We take payments in many ways:

Philip Barton Memorial Most Spirited High School Team: Get into the spirit, have fun and get creative. The team who is deemed to be the most high-spirited will receive a prize.
